#### Christmas long ago



Christmas is a busy time. We buy presents, we put up lights, and we plan our Christmas dinner. But did you ever think what Christmas was like many years ago?

Kitty is 95 years old. She grew up on a farm in the west of Ireland. When she was young Christmas was a lot different than it is today.

"We did not have a Christmas tree", Kitty said. "We went to the fields to get holly and ivy. We put holly over the fireplace and over the pictures. We would light a candle and put it in a jar and then put it on the window. On Christmas Eve, the youngest in the family would light this candle."



Christmas started early. In October, people made cakes and puddings. Farmers killed a pig to have ham and bacon. They had geese and sold them at the market in December. The Christmas dinner at that time was roast goose and ham. Roast turkey came later.

There were no big shops. People would buy food and clothes in small village shops. Kitty remembers, "Before Christmas, we did a big shop. This was called "bringing home the Christmas". We would buy sweets and new clothes."

Kitty said that this day was a great day for every family. The shopkeeper would give every customer a Christmas gift called the "Christmas Box". It had nice things like biscuits, sweets or a bottle of whiskey.

On Christmas Eve or at 6am on Christmas morning, all the family went to mass. After mass, the children looked for their presents from Santa. Kitty said, "One year, I got an orange and a banana from Santa. I was so happy. I had never seen them before, and they were so nice."

There were no TVs in homes in Ireland at that time. A few homes had a radio. On Christmas night, people went to the houses of their friends. They played cards, talked, and played music.



On Saint Stephen's Day, children and adults dressed up in old clothes and straw and went from house to house. They would sing and play music. People gave them money or sweets. This was called "hunting the Wren." Some places in Ireland still do this today.

Kitty lives alone now. Her family has passed away, so when she talks of Christmas long ago, she is a little bit sad. She still keeps some of the old Christmas ways.

She puts a candle on the window, but this is now an electric candle. She goes to mass on Christmas Eve. She cooks roast goose, and she has her money ready for people who will call to her "hunting the Wren" on Saint Stephen's Day.


