

# Did you know

The total number of learners in the Vocational Education Committee's (VEC's) adult literacy service (ALS) in 2011 was 56,797.

The number includes learners in the adult literacy service, English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) and Intensive Adult Basic Education (ITABE).

This represents an 4% increase on participation rates from 2010 (54,741).

## Where do we get this information?

The Department of Education and Skills (DES) provide the National Adult Literacy Agency (NALA) with this information. The information comes from the annual adult literacy returns (ALR's) that are provided to the DES by the 33 local VEC's.



58% (33,177) of literacy learners were women. This shows a decrease of 2% from 2010 however, male participation rates are up by 2% for the same period.

## **Age Profile**

Almost 50% (27,030) of all learners in the adult literacy service were aged between 25 and 44 years. The youngest age group (16-20 years) was only 3% and the oldest (65+ years) age group was 9% of the overall adult literacy population.




#### **Educational attainment**

Almost 70% (39,220) of I learners presented with less than a Leaving Certificate or FETAC level 4 qualification. This is a significant number when compared to the latest figures from the CSO which reported that 28% of the population have less than a FETAC level 4 qualification (CSO, Q2, 2011)

# **Employment status**

Over 27% (15,396) of learners were in employment. A further 38% (21,346) reported their employment status as unemployed. This is in contrast to the national picture where the unemployment rate stood at 14.3% (437,441) (CSO, 2011).


# Numbers of learners on different literacy programmes

The majority of learners take part in mainstream literacy programmes. Mainstream programmes consist of either one-to-one or group tuition for typically two to four hours per week during the academic year

## **Tuition type**

The majority of learners 86.2% (48,974) take part in group tuition. This reflects the large number of learners engaged in mainstream adult literacy programmes.



## Time spent in adult literacy service

36% (20,272) spent less than one year in the adult literacy service with a minority 12% spending five years or more in the service.

# **Staffing levels**

The adult literacy service is staffed by both paid and volunteer tutors. There are twice the number of volunteer tutors in the service (2,579) as there are paid tutors (1,288).
