The NALA Health Literacy Project was formally launched on November 11th. The Project aim is to breakdown the barrier to health services which poor literacy skills can create. With over 500,000 adults experiencing literacy difficulties in Ireland there are major implications for health providers and practitioners.

People experiencing literacy problems may find it difficult to read medicine bottles, health promotional material and signs in health centres or hospitals.

The project was launched by Micheál Martin, TD, Minister for Health & Children in Cork where it is based. This is the first Irish project specifically aimed at raising awareness and knowledge among health practitioners to better equip them to deal with the issue of poor literacy skills. Supporting English for Speakers of Other Languages

NALA has begun a consultation process to examine provision of English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) in Adult Literacy Schemes. This process will involve both national and international research on best practice in the provision of ESOL. The aim of the consultation process will be to develop policy guidelines and supports in relation to ESOL for the Literacy Service.

Update on the NALA Quality Framework

Currently NALA are finalising a plan to mainstream the Quality Framework. This plan has been informed by in-depth and survey research with key stakeholders on their attitudes towards using the Framework and the supports they require. The plan proposes to mainstream the Framework on a phased basis with phase 1 starting April 2002.

The plan will be sent to Literacy Schemes in February and will detail the steps that Schemes need to take to get involved in the Quality Framework. A limited number of Schemes can be accommodated in phase 1 (April-Dec 2002). Schemes that are successful in their application for involvement in 2002 will be given significant support to help them implement the Framework. Read all about it in the plan. The balance of Schemes will be accommodated in subsequent phases.

What is the Quality Framework?

It is a 'bottom up' quality assurance system designed specifically for the adult basic education (ABE) service. ABE stakeholders can use it to:

- * look systematically at their own practice,
- * compare it against the Framework,
- * identify ways to improve their practice.

Since it was very successfully piloted NALA have made the Framework more user-friendly and have developed an improved user-quide (available April 2002)

The benefits of using the Quality Framework

The advantages of using the Quality Framework were identified in the pilot as follows:

useful at any stage of a Scheme's development

- improves communications and relationships in Schemes
- promotes ownership and empowerment amongst all key stakeholders (e.g. learners, tutors and management).



Literacy Schemes are

already doing much of what is involved in using the Quality Framework e.g. planning programmes in line with learners' needs, providing a range of tuition options, etc. Using the Framework however makes Schemes' work more effective. Moreover it can actually lessen the workload of Adult Literacy Organisers and other ABE providers. For example, using the Quality Framework can be invaluable in helping to write the new local strategic development plans for the Department of Education and Science. These two initiatives compliment each other in three main areas:

Process – how you go about them Content – what you actually cover

Support – what can help you complete the process.

Final note

NALA Training update

NALA/WIT National Certificate for Literacy Tutors

For tutors who want to get accreditation, seven of the twelve modules from the NALA/WIT National Certificate for Literacy Tutors are now available as single certificates. This means that tutors can build up credits towards the full certificate on an ongoing basis. These modules generally involve 6 days of training plus assignments. Another module can be attained through the Scheme, if the initial training course has been validated by Waterford Institute of Technology (WIT). The NALA / WIT accreditation project uses Accreditation of Prior Learning, which is very innovative. This approach recognises the value of previous experience and awards exemptions from some modules.

Booking for training courses must be completed through your VEC Literacy Organiser, who will forward bookings to NALA or WIT as appropriate.

National Tutors Forum

The National Tutors Forum will be held on 26th January, 2002 in the Ashling Hotel. The forum will provide: updates on literacy developments, feedback to tutors on issues raised at the regional meetings and workshops on key themes. Last years inaugural event attracted 250 participants and was a very enjoyable and rewarding day and we look forward to a similar experience in January 2002.

Training Needs Analysis

Published by Kogan Page. Price €24.25/IR£19.10

This book is full of useful and practical advice for the less experienced ESOL teacher. It is presented in an easy-to-use format, with handy hints and practical suggestions, based on the authors' years of experience in this field. The seven chapters cover: planning for teaching and learning, meeting learners' needs, language work in the classroom, implementing self-access, using information and communication technologies, assessment, personal and professional development. Each tip or piece of advice/teaching strategy is outlined in bold, followed by the suggested way forward.

Beginning to Write

Published by Cambridge University Press. Price €26.03/IR£20.50


This book contains over 100 writing activities suitable for elementary and intermediate learners. The book shows that it is possible to take the teaching of writing seriously at an early stage in language learning. The introduction discusses the differences between speaking and writing, the purpose of writing and its real world uses. It gives a clear account of process writing and considers approaches to the teaching of writing. Beginning to Write contains activities, which can be used to:

- * Start learners writing with confidence
- * Focus on the writing process
- Show how valuable computers can be in teaching writing

Focus on outcomes and on the assessment of writing.

English ASAP Series – Connecting English to the Workplace

Published by Steck-Vaughan. Price €25.33/IR£19.95



The NALA Resource Room at present stocks the following titles from this series: English ASAP – Teachers Edition – Literacy Level English ASAP – Student Book – Literacy Level English ASAP – Student Book – Book 1 English ASAP – Student Book – Book 2

This material has already been well received by tutors working with ESOL learners. They are well designed and full of colour. The emphasis is on getting the learner ready for the world of work. These resources originate in the USA and there will be a few spelling differences. However, the content is very appropriate for learners in Ireland.

English for Everyday Activities Dictionary Published by New Readers Press. Price €15.87/IR£12.50

Based on the step-by-step aspects of daily activities, this American dictionary focuses on specific processes e.g. waking up, riding a bus, playing CDs, using an ATM. It is intended for adult learners and the sequenced coloured illustrations are clear and well drawn. Each sequence activity is described in a sentence underneath the picture, e.g. Jenny looked up Kate's phone number in the phone book. The dictionary originated in the USA, but it is still very appropriate for students in this country, apart from a few spelling differences.

English for Everyday Activities: A Picture Process Dictionary Activity Workbook Published by New Readers Press. Price €8.38/IR£6.60

A wide range of activities focus on the vocabulary from the main text of the dictionary. Learners practice through reading, writing and speaking exercises.

Five Minute Activities

Published by Cambridge University Press. Price €22.28/IR£17.55

Five-Minutes Activities offers over 130 short activities, and provides useful material which can be adapted to suit classes of different ability levels. Almost all the activities can be learner led. Some are well tried favourites, others offer new ideas and variations.


Fuel for Words: Energy Use & Saving Published by C. Maby. Price €35.49/IR£27.95

This manual was developed to raise awareness of the need for efficient use of energy in the home, to promote benefits to the household economy, comfort and health. It has been designed for use in literacy and ESOL classes and consists of a collection of practical activities, based on the theme of energy. Each chapter contains tutors' notes, activities and photocopiable worksheets, which offer a variety of

exercises at a basic level. The information is presented in a very clear style and the material illustrated with black and white drawings and diagrams.

Instant Lessons Series

Published by Pearson Education. Price €40.95/IR£32.25



This is a new and exciting range of photocopiable resources at three levels. NALA at present stock Elementary Level and Intermediate Level. Each book offers 40 complete lessons for practice in reading, writing, grammar and vocabulary, 10 for each section. Each lesson is designed to last around 55 minutes. Most of the activities involve learners in pair work or small groups. There are clear guidelines for the tutor on preparation, timings and keys to the activities.

Lessons from Nothing - Previewed

Published by Cambridge University Press.

Price €24.13/IR£19.90

Lessons on Nothing is a practical sourcebook of around 70 language teaching activities which do not require extensive facilities or preparation. Devised primarily for tutors this book is a valuable source of easy-to-use activities. The book includes well-known activities as well as original oneS and includes:



Longman Photo Dictionary

Published by Pearson Education.

Price €19.30/IR£15.20

Using full colour photographs and colour diagrams, this dictionary presents its information in a clear and lively way. It covers 3,000 basic words. Each page is devoted to a particular topic. The photographs are numbered and the key to the numbers



is printed on the same page. Topics are varied, up-to-date and appropriate for adults. They include hobbies and games, entertainment, sports, roads and road signs, electronics, kitchen equipment, opposites, prepositions, actions and emotions and many more. There are also short exercises to help practise new words.

Ship or Sheep: An Intermediate Pronunciation Course

Published by Cambridge University Press. Price €8.38/IR£6.60

This is a comprehensive pronunciation course for intermediate students of English. It provides systematic practice of English pronunciation, stress and intonation through a wide variety of interesting exercises and activities.

The course is accompanied by a recording of all the practice material on three cassettes. The book and the recording are both designed for use in class and by learners working alone. The complete course consists of: Ship or Sheep? Student's Book Cassettes 1, 2 & 3. Introducing English Pronunciation A Teacher's Guide.

Teaching Basic Literacy to ESOL Learners: A Training Course

Published by London LLU. Price €83.80/IR£66.00

This new teaching package provides a course of training, which covers the main aspects of the theory and practice of teaching reading and writing to beginner ESOL learners. The course consists of four whole day sessions, a materials workshop and a practical assignment. The publication contains a detailed lesson

plan, additional tutors' notes, training materials and ideas for incorporating the training video, which is available separately, into each of the four sessions.

It has 30 chapters, covering many aspects, including discourse, materials development, pronunciation, bilingualism, assessment, computer-assisted language learning and on-line communication.

Cambridge Learner's Dictionary Published by Cambridge University Press. Price €17.65/IR£13.95

This completely new dictionary is aimed at intermediate level students. It uses colour headwords with clear definitions in simple language and there are thousands of natural examples to show how words are used. It also includes a 32 page study section to help with grammar and vocabulary and has 16 pages of full colour illustrations.

Latest literacy study gives hope for the future

The results of a new survey gives a picture of the knowledge and skills of 15-year-olds. Called the Programme for International Student Assesment (PISA) it examined students in literacy, mathematics and science from 32 countries including Ireland. While the survey says that Ireland is the fifth best in literacy and the 16 best in maths there are still 10% of 15 year olds with 'Level 2' (International Literacy Survey) literacy or below. In addition PISA did not include the 15% of Irish 15-year-olds who were out of school or in training programmes.

Students sat pencil and paper assessments in their schools. In addition students and their principals also answered questionnaires about themselves and their schools. This allowed PISA to identify what factors are associated with better and worse performance.

The international survey involved 265,000 students and was conducted first in 2000, will be repeated every three years. PISA was co-ordinated by the Department of Education through the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD).
