Death of Terry Wogan

There was shock and sadness across Ireland and Britain on hearing of the sudden death of broadcaster Terry Wogan. The 77-year-old passed away on January 31st after a short illness.

Born in Limerick in 1938, he began his career on RTE radio in the 1960s but moved to England a few years later when he was offered a job with BBC radio. He was to spend the next 50 years working on radio and TV in the UK. He spent many of these years presenting an early morning radio programme, 'Wake Up to Wogan'.

His witty comments and good **humour** made him one of the most popular broadcasters in the UK, especially with the thousands of Irish people living there. His radio show had almost 8 million listeners. He was the BBC commentator for the Eurovision Song Contest for many years. For 35 years he was the main presenter of Children in Need, a BBC charity TV show which raised more than £600 million for children all over Britain.

In 2005 Terry was given a knighthood by Queen Elizabeth for his many years of service as a broadcaster. In his native Limerick in 1997 he was given the Freedom of the City. This is the highest honour that a city can give to one of its people. Terry was extremely proud to be Irish and was a regular visitor to Limerick.

He is survived by his wife Helen, two sons, a daughter and five grandchildren. May he rest in peace.

Election Fever

Over the next few weeks, the country will prepare for the general **election**, which will take place on Friday the 26th of February. It has been just over 5 years since the last general election. Since then, the country has faced some tough measures - including water charges and property taxes - in order to get back on its feet.

Ireland is divided into 40 areas, each of which is known as a constituency. Each constituency will have a number of candidates who will run for election. Many of the political parties will have people running in every constituency. People who are not members of any party can also run—they are known as independent candidates. The biggest parties are Fine Gael, Fianna Fáil, Labour and Sinn Féin. There are several smaller parties, including two that were set up in 2015. These are Renua and The Social Democrats.

In the coming weeks, we can expect to see election posters on every pole, leaflets through the letterbox and candidates calling to our doors hoping to encourage us to give them our 'number one'!

Remember, you cannot vote unless your name is on the voting register. You can check this in your local library, post office or garda station, or at www.checktheregister.ie.

The 1916 Rising

On Easter Monday 24th April 1916, Irish men and women, members of the Irish Volunteers, the Irish Citizen Army and the Irish Republican Brotherhood, held an armed rising against British rule in Ireland.

From the start events did not go well for the Irish. A ship bringing guns in for the Rising was captured by the British, who sank it and arrested the crew. Also, the Rising was due to take place on Easter Sunday but, the day before, Eoin MacNeill, commander of the Irish Volunteers, put a notice in the paper calling it off.

Despite all the confusion and the shortage of guns, the other commanders decided to go ahead with their plans on Easter Monday. Under the command of seven leaders, the rebel forces took over most of the larger public buildings around the city centre. The General Post Office (GPO) in O'Connell Street was their headquarters and they raised the Irish flag from its roof. On the front steps of the GPO, Pádraig Pearse read out the Proclamation of the Irish Republic. In this statement, the leaders declared Ireland a free country with equal rights for all. The Proclamation was signed by the seven leaders.

Britain was at war with Germany at the time. It was believed the British would have fewer soldiers in Ireland for that reason and that the Rising would catch them off guard. However, Britain sent 16,000 soldiers into Dublin and bombed the GPO and many other buildings. The city centre was in ruins as fires raged through the streets. The Irish soldiers were forced to surrender. The Rising lasted for just 5 days.

It is said that Pádraig Pearse sent a letter of surrender to the British commander, General Lowe, after seeing three elderly men, who were not involved in the Rising, shot down. He is reported to have said he didn't want any more innocent people killed. More than 500 people were killed and over 2,500 injured in the Rising.

The Irish soldiers were arrested and marched through the streets to prison. Onlookers shouted abuse and threw stones at them. Many were sent to prison in England and Wales. Within a few days, 15 of the prisoners, who were seen as the ringleaders, were put to death by shooting. As news spread of these executions, the public became angry and there was a lot of anti-British feeling. There was also worldwide sympathy for Ireland and support for its freedom.

The 1916 Rising itself ended badly, but from it came an Irish people who were no longer content with British rule in Ireland. Many of those who took part in the Rising went on to fight in the War of Independence and later played a major role in Irish politics. It was to take another 33 years before Ireland became an independent republic.

Next month is the 100th anniversary of the 1916 Easter Rising. Events are planned for Dublin and across Ireland to honour the men and women who fought in the Rising. In particular we think of those who were willing to risk their lives so that one day Ireland would be free. Their courage will forever be remembered.

Pádraig Pearse

Born in Dublin in 1879, Pearse was a teacher, a writer, a barrister and a student of Irish. His love of the Irish language and culture and his interest in education led him to set up a school for boys in Dublin, called Saint Enda's. Here, students were encouraged to speak Irish and have pride in Irish history.

Pearse was a leader in the Irish Volunteers and one of the writers of the Proclamation. He was commander of the group of soldiers who took over the GPO in 1916. On 29th April he gave the letter of surrender to the British commander. Pearse was sentenced to death for his part in the Rising and on 3rd May was shot in Kilmainham Jail. It is said that he whistled an Irish song as he was led to his death.

James Connolly

Connolly was born in Scotland to Irish parents. His family were very poor so he joined the British Army when he was only 14. He was sent to Ireland and while here he grew very fond of the Irish people. He also met his wife in Dublin. After deserting the British Army, Connolly lived in America for a while and then returned to Ireland.

He was very interested in the rights of workers. In 1912, along with Jim Larkin, he set up the Irish Labour Party. Both men organised the first big strike of workers in Dublin in 1913. Connolly set up the Irish Citizen Army in 1913, which went on to take part in the Rising.

Connolly was one of the writers of the Proclamation. After the surrender he was sentenced to death and was shot on May 12th 1916. As he was unable to stand due to his injuries, he was tied to a chair in front of the firing squad.

The Proclamation

This was a statement declaring Ireland an independent country with equal rights for all its people, men and women. Women are mentioned a few times in the Proclamation, which was unusual for the time. Women in most countries at this time could not vote, were paid less than men and were not treated as equal.



The Proclamation was printed the night before the Rising. On Easter Monday Pearse read it out from the steps of the GPO. The seven men who signed the Proclamation were:

Thomas J. Clarke, Seán Mac Diarmada, Pádraig Pearse, James Connolly, Thomas MacDonagh, Eamonn Ceannt and Joseph Plunkett. All seven men were sentenced to death and were shot by firing squad in Kilmainham Jail.

Cumann na mBan (the Women's Council)

Early in 1914 a group of women held a meeting in Dublin and set up Cumann na mBan as the women's wing of the Irish Volunteers. During the Rising many of its members fought alongside the men. Others looked after the wounded, brought food and carried messages. After the surrender, over 70 women were taken to prison.

After the Rising, many members continued to fight for Irish freedom. The best known was Countess Constance Markievicz, who was elected three times as a TD. She became Minister for Labour, one of the first women in Europe to become a minister. She died in 1927 at the age of 59.

Census 2016

Census night will be on Sunday 24th April.

Most of you will already have received a **census form**. On the night of 24th April, an adult in each home must fill out the form, giving details of every person staying there on that night.

What is a census? A census is a count of every person who is in Ireland on a given night. It gives us a number for the total **population** of the country as well as the population of each county, city, town, village and parish in Ireland. It also gives the number of men and women and the age breakdown of our population. This is important information for the Government when planning for the future in such things as education and healthcare, the building of schools and hospitals, and care for the elderly. The last census was in 2011 and the total population of the Republic of Ireland at that time was almost 4.6 million people.

The census is carried out by the **Central Statistics Office (CSO)**. The CSO employs people known as **enumerators** to call to every household in Ireland to
deliver and collect the forms. More than 4,600
enumerators will visit more than 2 million homes
across Ireland over the coming weeks. The
enumerator will also give help to anyone who finds
the form difficult to complete. The information given
on the forms is confidential.

Ireland loves chocolate

Over Easter it is believed that more than 17.7 million chocolate Easter eggs were eaten in Ireland. The total amount spent on chocolate eggs is thought to be in the region of €37 million.

With most supermarkets offering three eggs for €5 it is thought that on average every household will have eaten at least eight eggs over the holiday weekend with most children receiving an average of five eggs each!

No government yet!

It is almost 6 weeks since the **General Election** and we are still waiting for our TDs to agree on a new **government**.

A party needs 79 seats to form a government.

However, no one party won enough seats. So we now have a situation where the 2 biggest parties, Fine Gael (50 seats) and Fianna Fáil (44 seats), must enter into talks with the smaller parties and the Independent TDs, in the hope of getting their support. It is also believed that the leaders of these 2 parties, Enda Kenny and Micheál Martin, will sit down together to see if they can work together to form a government.

If all talks fail over the coming weeks and months, we may see another General Election being held before the end of 2016.

Microchip your dog

Since 1st April all dogs must now, by law, be microchipped. A microchip is a tiny electronic device which is placed under the dog's skin. This must be done by a vet. It does not hurt the dog.

The chip contains a number which is entered into a government database which will also have the name and contact details of the dog's owner. So, if your dog goes missing and is found and brought to a vet or a dog pound, a scan of the dog's microchip will show up your name and phone number so you can be contacted.


The cost of microchipping varies between €20 and €50. If your dog is not microchipped then you could face a fine of up to €5,000.

Darkness into Light



Last Saturday 7th May, more than 120,000 people took part in the annual Darkness into Light walk and run. It was held in over 100 **locations** all over Ireland, as well as in other parts of the world. The event, which is in its 8th year, is **organised** by the charity Pieta House who offer help to people at risk of suicide and self-harm.

The walk is called Darkness into Light because the walk begins at 4.15 am, when still dark, and finishes as the sun rises to give wonderful daylight. This has also become the symbol for Pieta House, whose help and support brings light to those who are going through a dark time in their lives.

Pieta House was set up ten years ago by Dublin woman Joan Freeman, when a member of her family died by suicide. There are now 9 centres all over the country, with 180 trained staff who provide help, free of charge, to those in danger of suicide. Over the past 10 years they have helped more than 20,000 people. Sadly there are still many deaths by suicide in Ireland every year.

Staff at Pieta House realise that it takes a lot of courage for someone to admit they have a problem and seek help. Therefore every person who comes through their doors is welcomed with love and respect.

Events such as Darkness into Light are very important in **providing** much needed funds, so that they can continue to offer this support to those at risk.

A Government at last

Finally, ten weeks after the general **election** we have a new government. It will be a Fine Gael led Government which will include a number of **independent** TDs.

After a lot of talks and meetings between the parties and the Independent TDs, Enda Kenny received enough support to, once again, become **Taoiseach**. In return for their support, 3 Independents will be given jobs as ministers, while many of the same people in the last Government will return as ministers.

Enda Kenny is now the longest serving TD in the Dáil, having being first elected in 1975. He is also the only Fine Gael leader to serve as Taoiseach for a second time. In his acceptance speech, he said this Government would concentrate on "improving the quality of the lives of people" with the housing crisis being one of the most important areas.



Death of Muhammad Ali

People all over the world were saddened to hear of the death of the most famous boxer of all time, Muhammad Ali. Known as "The Greatest", Ali passed away on June 3rd at the age of 74. He had been suffering from Parkinson's disease for over 30 years.

Born in Louisville, Kentucky, and boxing since he was 12, he won an Olympic gold medal in 1960. Ali won his first world heavyweight title in 1964 and was the first boxer to become world champion three times. Ali was famous for the speed at which he moved around the ring and the power behind his punches. His boxing style was summed up by his famous saying "Float like a butterfly sting like a bee, the hands can't hit what the eyes can't see".

In 1967 Ali refused to fight with the US army in the Vietnam war. He asked why would he help kill people in another country when his own black people in America were still not given equal rights. His world title was taken off him and he was not allowed to fight for more than 3 years.

Outside of boxing, Ali was a supporter of human rights and spoke out strongly against all kinds of **discrimination** on grounds of colour or disability. He was a supporter of the Special Olympics and in 2003 when the Special Olympics were held in Ireland, Ali, along with Nelson Mandela, attended the opening ceremony.

In 2009 Ali visited Ennis where thousands of people lined the streets to greet and honour the world's most famous sportsman known as "The Greatest".

Winners all round

There was great excitement when County Down born Rory McIlroy recently won the Irish Open Golf tournament for the first time. McIlroy, who is 27, was moved to tears as he was presented with the trophy. Although he is among the top three golfers in the world and has won many major titles, the young golfer said it was special to win in front of a home crowd.

The Irish Open was held in the K Club in County Kildare. Weather during the event ranged from brilliant sunshine to thunder, lightning and hail showers with play being called off on two days. However, it did not stop the crowds from attending and they were rewarded for their efforts when McIlroy played some of his best shots ever to win the competition

Three years ago McIlroy set up a children's charity known as the "Rory Foundation", to help children in need from all over the world. All money from ticket sales for the Irish Open was given to the charity. Rory himself donated his prize money which was €666,000.

The children's charities to receive the funds are: The Laura Lynn Foundation which runs a hospice for children; the Jack and Jill Foundation which provides home nursing and help for families of seriously ill children; and finally Barretstown which is a holiday and activity park for sick children and their families.

When to use an apostrophe

Olympics 2016



The 2016 Summer Olympic Games are all set to take place. The games will be held in Rio de Janeiro in Brazil from 5th to 21st August 2016. More than 10,500 athletes from over 200 countries will take part in competitions in 28 different sports.

To win an Olympic medal is every sportsperson's dream. This is the event that they have worked and trained for all their sporting life. To be given the chance to take part in the Olympics is the highest point in a person's sporting career. Only the world's top athletes can take part.

Ireland has been sending a team to the games since 1922. Over the years we have won 9 gold medals: 3 in swimming, 2 in boxing and 4 in athletics. Boxer Katie Taylor was our last gold medal winner in 2012 and she will take part again this year.

Brazil is one of the countries that is affected by the **Zika virus**, which is an illness that can be picked up by humans from a **mosquito** bite. If a pregnant woman gets the virus there can be a serious risk to her baby. Earlier it was believed that the Olympics would be moved from Brazil because of the virus. However, the World Health Organisation has said the risk to people is in fact very low. Despite this, several sportspeople have pulled out of the games, including Irish golfer Rory McIlroy.

More than 70 athletes will travel to Rio to represent Ireland. We wish them all every success.

The Boys in Green

The Republic of Ireland soccer team have just returned from the European Championship which was held in France.

Under the **management** of Martin O'Neill and Roy Keane, the team did the country proud getting as far as the 2nd round of the games.

They played four matches in total, with their matches against Italy and finally against France being two of their best ever displays of football.

In fact the Mayor of Paris has written to President Higgins to say she is awarding the Irish supporters the Medal of the City of Paris as a reward for their good sportsmanship.

Brexit




Race for the White House

Death of rugby Giant


There was shock and sadness across Ireland on hearing of the sudden death of Munster rugby head coach, Anthony Foley. The 42-year-old died in his sleep while in Paris on the morning when the Munster team were due to play a European club match.

His body was flown home on a special Ryanair flight, FR 8, called after the number 8 jersey that Foley wore for many years playing with Munster and Ireland.

Clare man Anthony, who was nicknamed Axel, played professional rugby for Munster and was captain when they won the Heineken Cup in 2006. He also played for Ireland and played in two World Cups. He was Irish captain on three occasions and in all played 62 matches in the Irish Jersey.

In 2011, having retired from playing, he took on the job as coach with Munster. His father Brendan was also a Munster and Ireland player and his sister Rosie has played international women's rugby for Ireland.

Thousands of friends, rugby players and fans of all ages turned out to his funeral which took place in his native Killaloe in County Clare.

Two days after his funeral Munster lined out for their first match without Foley. The match was against Glasgow Warriors in Thomond Park Limerick. With a mixture of sadness and determination the players put in a massive performance which saw them winning on a score of 38 points to 17.

After the match, Foley's two sons joined the team on the field when they sang the Munster team anthem "Stand up and Fight".

Following Foley's funeral his young son, Tony, set up a Facebook page as a tribute to his father. In it he asked

people to attend Mass for the 8 Sundays following his Dad's death and to light a candle to remember his Dad and all loved ones who have passed away. He named it #8masses4no8, again remembering the number 8 jersey his father wore for many years. May the late Anthony Foley rest in peace.

Ireland beat the All Blacks

Just weeks following Foley's death the Irish Rugby team beat New Zealand (the All Blacks) for the first time ever.

The All Blacks, who are the World Champions and who had been unbeaten in an unbelievable 18 matches before this, are said to be the greatest All Blacks team ever. Ireland beat them on a score of 40:29. Before the historic match the Irish team lined out in the shape of the number 8, in another tribute to the late Anthony Foley.

Olympic medal at last for Heffernan

Race walker Rob Heffernan, from Cork, has finally received a bronze Olympic medal four years after he competed in the 50km road race in the 2012 British Olympic games. Heffernan came 4th at that time, just short of getting a medal. However, the athlete who came 1st has since been found to have taken drugs to improve his performance and he has had his medal taken away. This meant that Heffernan was moved to 3rd place, giving him a bronze medal.

Race walking is said to be one of the toughest sports, with judges watching the walkers closely to check that one foot remains on the ground at all times.

38-year-old Heffernan already has a gold medal from the 2013 World Championships and a bronze medal from the 2010 European Championships. He has competed in five Olympic Games but this is his first Olympic medal.

Heroes

When people speak of heroes they often think of famous sportspeople, singers or actors. However, real heroes are often those people who have spent their lives caring for and fighting on behalf of those who need a helping hand.

Brother Kevin Crowley has been running the Capuchin Day Centre in Dublin since 1974. Now in his 80's and despite having had two major heart operations, Brother Kevin is working harder than ever. Nothing has prepared him for the increase in numbers attending the centre in recent years. The centre provides two meals a day to almost 600 people. They give out 2,000 food parcels a week and also provide showers, clothes and a health clinic.

Above all, Brother Kevin says that everyone who comes to the centre is made feel welcome and is treated with kindness. He says that in recent years it is alarming to meet the number of families, with young children, who are homeless. Many of these have been given temporary homes in hotels, therefore they have



nowhere to cook and the children have nowhere to play.

It costs over €2.5 million a year to run the centre. They get €450,000 from the government

so they depend on donations from the public to make up the shortfall. With Christmas just around the corner, the centre expects to cater for more than 3,000 people during Christmas week.

Father Peter McVerry set up his first hostel in Dublin in 1979, for young people who were living on the streets. Now the Peter McVerry Trust has 11 hostels,



100 apartments and 3 drug treatment centres and reaches out to more than 4,000 young homeless people every year.

For 40 years, Peter has stood up for all those who have no one to talk for them. He believes

that any one of us could become homeless at any

time. He believes the first step in helping people to get back on their feet is to treat them with respect and help them to feel good about themselves. He says that this starts with giving them a home.

Adi Roche set up the organisation Chernobyl Children International to help children affected by the Chernobyl Nuclear disaster.

In April 1986, a major explosion took place at a nuclear power factory in Chernobyl in Russia. As a result, radioactive gas spilled out and poisoned the air and countryside for hundreds of miles. In the 30 years since the explosion, over a million people have died as a result of cancer, heart problems and other illnesses.

The area around Chernobyl is still contaminated and babies are still being born with health problems. The land cannot be used for farming and more than 17 million people live in poverty.

Since 1991, Adi Roche and Chernobyl Children International have been bringing children to Ireland from affected areas of Russia, for life saving treatment and holidays. Over 25,000 children have stayed here with Irish families. Even a short period away from the contaminated areas can make a big difference to the health of a child.

Over €100 million has been raised in Ireland to buy lifesaving equipment for local hospitals in affected areas of Russia, and to build homes for homeless children and young adults.


