A New Government.

Finally, five months after the general election we have a new government. After many months of talks and promises between the leaders of all parties and independent TDs, Fianna Fáil, Fine Gael and the Green Party have joined together to form a coalition government. Although Sinn Féin were the party that won the most seats in the election they did not have enough seats to form a government on their own and did not manage to get the backing of any of the other parties.

This is in fact the first time in history that the two big parties of FF and FG have come together to form a government, both parties being rivals on opposite sides since 1926. Leaders of the 3 parties, Michéal Martin, FF, Leo Varadkar FG and Eamon Ryan the Green Party, came together to form a programme of recovery for the country which includes managing the Covid emergency, getting

people back to work, housing and Brexit.

The role of Taoiseach and leader of the government will be







rotated, Michéal Martin will be Taoiseach now for 2 years after which Leo Varadkar will take it on for the next 2 years. The main members of the Government known as the Cabinet which is made up of 15 senior ministers are from each of the 3 parties, 6 from FF, 6 from FG and 3 from the Green Party.

Tony Holohan awarded Freedom of Dublin

Chief Medical Officer with the Department of Health, Dr. Tony Holohan is to be awarded the freedom of the City of Dublin. Dr Holohan was the

chief medical expert giving advice to the government and to the public during the Covid crisis of the last 5 months. He has recently stepped



down from this position for family reasons.

To be awarded the freedom of a city is a great honour. The new Mayor of Dublin, Hazel Chu, who proposed him for the award, thanked Dr Holohan for the calm and patient manner in which he informed and gave updates to the country daily during the Covid crisis.

Death of Jack Charlton The death took place recently of Jack Charlton. He was a former professional footballer and a member of the England team, along with his brother, Bobby, who won the World Cup in 1966. However, it will be as former Republic of Ireland soccer manager that he will be most remembered for here, holding the position from 1986 to 1996. He led the Republic of Ireland soccer team to their first ever World Cup in 1990 where they reached the quarter finals. During

Charlton's time as manager
Ireland qualified for the
European Championship in
1988 and also for the 1994
World Cup. He was made an
honorary Irish citizen in 1996
and was also given freedom of




the City of Dublin award in 1994. An Post and the British Royal Mail together created a postmark in his honour. The postmark, which read "Jack Charlton, 1935-2020" was stamped across all mail posted in England and the Republic of Ireland until August Ireland until August 9th.


