Halloween

Halloween is a festival that is celebrated today in almost every part of the world. Children dress up as witches, ghosts



and other scary creatures. They go from door to door for "trick or treat" in the hope of being given sweets and other goodies. Halloween games are played and sometimes bonfires are lit. Pumpkins of all sizes are carved into faces and lit with candles and are placed outside houses along with other weird and wonderful scary decorations.

However, did you know that the festival we now know as Halloween began in Ireland more than 3,000 years ago?

Halloween began as the festival of Samhain, (saw win) the Irish word for November. This was a very important festival in Ireland thousands of years ago. This was the day people celebrated their New Year. It marked the end of summer and celebrated the harvesting of crops of vegetables and fruit which would be gathered and stored as food for the long winter ahead. In fact, they believed that crops not picked before 1st November should not be eaten. People gathered around bonfires and shared out fruit, nuts and vegetables.

It also marked the beginning of the long winter ahead. It was believed that on the night of October 31st, ghosts and evil spirits roamed the earth looking for people to take back with them to the world of the dead. So, people believed that if they dressed up as ghosts that this would confuse the spirits into thinking they were one of them. This is where today's tradition of dressing up as ghosts began.

Along with bonfires, lanterns made out of turnips carved with a face and a candle inside, were left outside the door to keep evil spirits away. This

tradition came about because of the old Irish legend of Jack O Lantern. This legend tells the story of a blacksmith named Jack who tried to trick the devil. When he died he was not allowed enter into heaven or hell so to this day he still roams the earth with just the light of a burning coal which he carries in a turnip.

Irish people who emigrated to America over the years, brought the Irish custom of Halloween with them. Turnips were not available in America so they carved pumpkins instead. Today pumpkins are used at Halloween all over the world including Ireland. In fact, it is thought that in America 700 million dollars will be spent on buying pumpkins for Halloween this year. The bad



news for the environment is that most of these pumpkins will end up as waste.

The tradition of children going from house to house on Halloween night for "Trick or Treat" followed by party games, first began in America in the 1930's. However it is believed that again this tradition began many hundreds of years ago when poor people also dressed up at Halloween, calling to the houses of the rich in the hope of being given food and drinks.
