2021 A Look Back

COVID-19 was still top of the news headlines across the world this year. Here in Ireland, as cases grew it was late March before the schools reopened after Christmas. We had to wait until June and July for restaurants, bars, cafes and hairdressers to reopen. The COVID-19 vaccination programme was rolled out for all adults who wished to be vaccinated. Once vaccinated a certificate was given out and this certificate had to be shown before being allowed into restaurants, bars, cinemas, gyms and other indoor events.



In January, the United States of America (USA) welcomed their new president and vice president. Joe Biden was sworn in as the 46th

President of the USA. At 78 this was his third time running for president and he is the oldest ever president to be elected. Biden's ancestors came from Mayo and Louth and he is very proud of his Irish background. Kamala Harris was sworn in as US vice president and in doing so made history as she became the first woman as well as the first American of colour to hold the second most important job in the US government. Outgoing president Trump refused to attend the ceremony as he still insisted that he won the election.

The Olympic and Paralympic Games were held this year in Tokyo in Japan. The games which are normally held every four years were postponed in 2020 due to COVID-19. The games were held within strict COVID-19 guidelines and spectators

were not allowed attend.

Ireland sent teams to both
games in which they
brought home a total of six

gold, two silver and three bronze medals. Among the gold medal winners was Dublin boxer Kellie Harrington who was taking part in her first Olympics. Tipperary jockey Rachael Blackmore made history in April when she became the first woman to win the English Grand National in

Aintree. It is regarded as one of the most difficult races in the world. Only the world's top horses and riders are allowed to take part. It is every jockey's dream to win it.



Limerick won the All-Ireland hurling championship for the second year in a row when they defeated Cork. However, it was heartbreak for Mayo once again when they were beaten by Tyrone in the All-Ireland Football final. Mayo have been in eight finals since 2004 and have not won an All-Ireland title since 1951.

The All-Ireland Camogie title went west when Galway beat Cork while Meath won the All-Ireland Ladies Football final beating a strong Dublin team who were going for five in a row.


President Michael D Higgins celebrated his 80th birthday this year. He is currently serving his second term as president which will end in 2025. Before becoming president, he was a TD for Galway East, a Minister and a college lecturer. He is also a poet and a writer and this year finished writing his 12th book.

In October this year, Paddy Moloney founder of the famous Irish band The Chieftains, passed away at the age of 83. A talented and popular musician, he was very well respected and along with the Chieftains played in concerts all over the world including at the Great Wall of China.

They were invited to play at Joe Biden's inauguration but due to COVID-19 were unable to travel at the time.
