# Wildflowers of Ireland



From early spring, the Irish countryside comes alive with colour after the long winter months, as wildflowers appear in woodlands, ditches, roadsides and gardens.

So, what is a wildflower? A wildflower means a flower that grows naturally in the wild. Some people see these as weeds and use dangerous weed killers and chemicals to get rid of them. But these flowers and plants are far from being weeds; they play a big part in nature.



Wildflowers provide food for bees, butterflies, moths, insects, birds and other creatures. Bees and birds are really important as they help to pollenate and move seeds and pollen from one plant to another which they need to grow. Plants such as tomatoes, strawberries and other fruits need to be pollenated if they are to produce fruit. More than one third of the plant food we eat depends on bees for pollination.

Farming and gardening methods have changed over the past 50 years, with more chemicals and fertilisers being used which has, sadly, killed off many of the native wildflowers. With nothing to feed on, our honeybees and insect population is falling at a fast rate.

Farmers and gardeners are all now being encouraged to leave parts of their gardens or fields over to wild flower meadows to encourage bees and wildlife. An acre of wildflowers could produce enough nectar to feed 60,000 honeybees.

When you are out and about in the countryside, or the park in your town, you will be amazed at all the colourful wildflowers you can find if you take the time to look!

Here we look at some of the more common wildflowers that can be found in Ireland.



Dandelions, Buttercups, Foxgloves, Clover, Meadow Sweet and Cowslips can be found in fields, meadows and on the roadsides. Ox Eye daisies are generally seen on waste ground and gravel but will also grow in gardens. Bluebells and Wild Garlic are usually found in woodland areas.



## Irish Special Olympics Team



A 73-member team represented Ireland in the Special Olympics which took place in Berlin, Germany. The team were cheered on by their families, friends and many supporters from all over Ireland who travelled to the games.

Special Olympics is an organisation that was set up to provide training and opportunities for young people and adults with an intellectual disability to take part in sporting events. The organisation was set up in America in 1968 by Eunice Kennedy, a sister of the late president John F Kennedy. The Special Olympics take place every two years in different parts of the world.

In all 7,000 Special Olympics athletes, from 190 countries, took part in Berlin. We are very proud of our Irish team as they put in many hours of training all year round to take part in 12 sporting events such as athletics, gymnastics, swimming and many more. Team Ireland returned home to a big welcome having won 24 Gold, 22 Silver and 29 Bronze medals in the games.




