## Irish fairs and festivals

In Ireland we love our festivals and 2023 has seen all the usual ones taking place again this year. However, some of these festivals have been going for many hundreds of years.

**Puck Fair** takes place in the small town of Killorglin in Co. Kerry on the 10, 11 and 12 of August every year. Regarded as the oldest festival in Ireland, the first fair can be traced back to the 1600's.

On day one of the festival, a wild, mountain, male goat, which is known as a puck, is declared the King of the Fair and a crown is placed on his head. He is then, brought through the town on the back of a lorry where he leads the parade. A queen of the fair is also chosen from among young girls living in the area.

It is not known for certain why the fair is named in honour of a goat. It is believed that hundreds of years ago, a herd of goats ran down from the mountains to warn the people that an army of British warriors were coming to raid the town. Others believe that the male goat was seen as a symbol of good luck for a good harvest in the coming year.

In the past, the goat would be held for the three days of the festival, but now he only appears on the first evening and on the last day for a short period. The festival is filled with street entertainment, concerts, a funfair and, of course, a large outdoor market on the town's main street.

**Lisdoonvarna Matchmaking Festival** has been going since the 1800's. The festival takes place during the entire month of September in the small town of Lisdoonvarna in Co Clare. In the past, it was attended mostly by people from the farming community. September was their rest month after the busy harvest season. It was also an opportunity to meet a partner and use the services of the local matchmaker who had an office in the centre of the small town.

The matchmaker was a man named Willie Daly and he had a book known as the Matchmaking book, in which he held all the personal details of anyone who wished for him to find them a match. He was very successful over the years and there were many hundreds of couples who met in Lisdoonvarna.

Today the great grandson of Willie Daly, also called Willie Daly, is continuing the matchmaking tradition and he still uses the same famous book which is now believed to be 150 years old. Today, during the month of September, Lisdoonvarna comes alive with dancing and sing-songs taking place every day from early in the morning until late in the evening. Many thousands of people still visit and enjoy the festival every year.

Horse Fairs have always been a big part of life in Ireland. In fact, up until the 1970's nearly every small town and village held a horse fair. They were not just a day for buying and selling horses but street traders set up stalls that sold everything from tools and tea sets to fresh vegetables. Today there are still a few large horse fairs held in Ireland.

**Spancil Hill** in Co Clare is home to the annual horse fair which is held on June 23 each year and has become famous worldwide because of the well-known song "The Cross of Spancil Hill". Horses, ponies and donkeys can be bought or sold here on the day. Prizes are also given to the best horses of the fair.

Last year, Spancil Hill celebrated its 400th anniversary and, over the 400 years, the fair has had to be cancelled only a few times. The most recent being in 2020 and 2021 due to Covid.

Taking place every year on the Tuesday following the October bank holiday, is the **Maam Cross Pony Fair** in Connemara, Co Galway. For many hundreds of years, people have come to the famous crossroads to buy and sell the famous Connemara Ponies. In the past the small farmers in the area around Connemara would sell vegetables, eggs and turf in order to make a few extra pounds before the winter.

Today the fair still brings large crowds to the area where there is music and entertainment. Sheep and cattle are also bought and sold here.

The largest horse fair in Ireland today is the **Ballinasloe Horse Fair** which takes place in the Co. Galway town every year, beginning on the first Sunday in October. The fair itself can be traced back to the 1800's. Today it has become more than just a horse fair and is held over eight days. The town of Ballinasloe comes alive with fun events, street stalls, fireworks, tug-o-war, arts & crafts, music and children's events.
